







Health is not based on appearance






Thinking Outside the Box

The Art Department, which has been at PHS since the early 1970s, opens a door that would be closed in its absence.

The art program here is active in many contests and art showings. The department participates in Youth Art Month, when handmade signs can be seen lining Pirate Cove; the Art Department also enters some small state contests. They compete in things like Scholastics and participate in Doodle for Google annually. The students also compete in small nationwide competitions.



There is a variety of trips the art program takes. Sometimes they take students to visit art departments at different colleges to show the students what the different programs have to offer; trips have also been made to visit some artists while they were doing their work in a particular field. The department has trips it takes for the NAHS, National Art Honors Society; but those are for members only.

It is sometimes hard for teenagers, well anyone, to “step outside the box”, but through the art program, students are given the chance to do just that; and after Art I, students may proceed to Art II and then to the area of their choosing and hone in on their skills in that particular area, but to make it to the higher levels, it helps to keep a positive attitude. When asked ‘What is something kids love about being in art?’, Mrs. Felicia Lee, one of the art teachers at PHS, replied, “It allows students the freedom to be who they really are.”

Dr. Lundy Brantley, principal, believes that analytical skills learned through art are instrumental in helping students score well on state testing.

Pearl High School has an open door that would not even exist if it were not for the art program.

“I believe the art program here at PHS contributes to a myriad of benefits to our school, community, and administration. The art program teaches “out of the box” thinking to our students. Not only are students learning how to produce quality art, but the students are learning how to analyze art which in turn allows the students to learn analytical skills that can be applied to every area of school and life in general. This helps our community in that if a student is analytical, then the student is more versatile for our work force. As far as a benefit to the administration, the analytical piece that I mentioned goes along with state testing in that it can help raise our test scores. Our Art Program at PHS is definitely second to none!” - Dr. Lundy Brantley
