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National Merit Finalists

The National Merit Scholarship Program is an academic competition for recognition and scholarships that began in 1955. High school students enter the National Merit Program by taking the PSAT/NMSQT—a test which serves as an initial screen of approximately 1.5 million entrants each year—and by meeting published program entry/participation requirements. About 16,000 students qualify as semifinalists. Then, some 15,000 students advance to Finalist standing. To be considered for a finalist position, a student must have a record of consistently high academic performance in all grades 9th through 12th, be a U.S. citizen, and be enrolled in the last year of high school and be planning to enroll full time in college.

Michael leaves us with this bit of wisdom, "High school's a great time to figure out who you are."




Setting the Stage

When Drew learned he was named a National Merit Finalist, he was ecstatic. "It was almost a surreal experience."



"It's a whole new level of life, meeting new people and getting used to a new environment... *It's a new journey*."

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
Where Are You Headed?


